A regular meeting of the Borough Council of Quakertown was held March 4, 2015, 7:28 p.m.

The following members and officers were present: President L. James Roberts, Vice President Donald Rosenberger, Council members David Erwin, Lisa Gaier, Michael Johnson, Jann Paulovitz, Douglas Propst, Solicitor Charles Fonzone, Manager Scott C. McElree and Asst. Borough Secretary Kris Barndt.

RESOLVED, That, the Minutes of February 4 continued to February 23, 2015 and the minutes of a special meeting of February 7, 2015 be approved as written. Motion of Councilman Rosenberger, seconded by Councilman Propst. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

Motion of Councilman Rosenberger, seconded by Councilman Johnson.

President Roberts stated that he will abstain from voting as several purchases were made from the Friendly Book Store. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

RESOLVED, That, the Financial Statement, Police Department, Zoning Administrator and Building Inspector reports be received and filed. Motion of Councilman Erwin, seconded by Councilwoman Gaier. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

President Roberts declared a recess to allow a public hearing for SLJ Restaurant, LLC's request for an inter-municipal liquor license to be transferred to 315 W. Broad Street.

President Roberts called the public hearing. There were no public comments made.

Councilman Rosenberger asked when the liquor license would become effective. Richard Lefchak, Esquire from W. Conshohocken, PA for the applicant Sarah Jones, stated there are several steps to go through. They would proceed as soon as possible with the PLCB application after Council's approval is received.

Solicitor Charles Fonzone noted that the public hearing was advertised. Solicitor Fonzone asked Mrs. Jones if she would have ample parking. Mrs. Jones replied that the establishment is in the Quaker Village Shopping Center, at the location which was previously a bakery, and she has access to all of the parking spaces.

The full stenographer transcript of the hearing is on file in the Borough Manager's office.

President Roberts declared the public hearing closed.

RESOLVED, That, the following Resolution 43-15, request of SLJ Restaurant, LLC for an Inter-municipal liquor license, be adopted:

WHEREAS, a request was received from SLJ Restaurant, LLC. of 379 W. Broad Street for an inter-municipal liquor license to be used at the location of 315 W. Broad Street, Quakertown; and

WHEREAS, an advertised public hearing was held for the purpose of receiving comments and recommendations of interested individuals residing within the Borough of Quakertown.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That, the Borough Council of the Borough of Quakertown grants the request for approval of an inter-municipal liquor license to SLJ Restaurant, LLC.

Motion of Councilwoman Gaier, seconded by Councilman Johnson. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

Visitors for the regular meeting:

Steve Biddle, 130 S. Main Street indicated he wanted to speak in reference to the Rail Trail project.

President Roberts indicated that Mr. Biddle could speak at this time. Mr. Biddle mentioned that the Borough is receptive of the 300 mile multi-state trail that is proposed to extend into the Quakertown area from the Saucon Valley Rail Trail in Coopersburg which will then continue south to Perkasie. There will be an east-west segment which will start in the area of Lake Tohee and pass through Quakertown Borough to the Red Hill area. Northampton County Highlands Trail Planning Committee is requesting that Council endorse a resolution of support declaring sponsorship for the north-south trail project. Mr. Biddle requested an additional paragraph be added to Quakertown Borough's Resolution 42-15.

President Roberts stated that the paragraph would be added to Resolution 42-15.

Councilman Johnson asked if the trail would be on the abandoned train tracks. Mr. Biddle replied that the future trail would be several feet away from the train tracks with a safety fence divider.

RESOLVED, That, the following Resolution 42-15, endorsing the Quakertown Rail Trail Project, be adopted:

RESOLUTION 42-15

A RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT ENDORSING THE QUAKERTOWN RAILTRAIL PROJECT

WHEREAS, officials of the Borough of Quakertown, Pennsylvania, consider bicycle and

pedestrian transportation to be of utmost importance to the region by providing the region with recreation and transportation opportunities, as well as, the possibilities of economic and community development; and

WHEREAS, East Penn Railroad, LLC currently leases trackage from the Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (SEPTA), known as the "Quakertown line", operating from Quakertown, Pennsylvania to Pennsylvania Northeast Railroad in Telford, Pennsylvania; and

WHEREAS, the Saucon Rail Trail is an established 6.85 mile bicycle and pedestrian trail in the Borough of Hellertown, Lower Saucon Township, Upper Saucon Township, and the Borough of Coopersburg, Pennsylvania, built along an unused portion of a railroad corridor which continues into Springfield Township, Pennsylvania and Richland Township, Pennsylvania, becoming the "Quakertown line"; and,

WHEREAS, extending the Saucon Rail Trail into the Borough of Quakertown, Pennsylvania would provide new bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure to connect residents and visitors to nearby businesses, parks, schools, libraries, and other community assets; and,

WHEREAS, officials of the Borough of Quakertown conclude that the proposed Rail-Trail is consistent with, and complimentary to: the Quakertown Comprehensive Plan, Quakertown Open Space Plan and Quakertown Park and Recreation Policy/Plan; and,

WHEREAS, officials of the Borough of Quakertown wish to join their neighbors of the greater Quakertown Region to endorse said project; and,

WHEREAS, officials of the Borough of Quakertown, Pennsylvania feel that it is in the best interest of the citizens of that Borough, as well as, the greater Quakertown Region to endorse said project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That, the Council of the Borough of Quakertown, Pennsylvania hereby endorses the Quakertown Rail-Trail Project and seeks to pursue the establishment of a bicycle and pedestrian trail along this corridor, while maintaining a rail corridor for both present and future uses.

Motion of Councilman Propst, seconded by Councilman Rosenberger. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

Councilman Rosenberger questioned the pension implication of this policy. Manager McElree answered to be considered for this policy the officer whether having twelve years of service or not must leave his contributions in for the twelve month period and not take advantage of withdrawing any of it.

Councilman Rosenberger asked if an officer leaves and comes back does that year count as a break in service when calculating their pension. Manager McElree stated their pension credit stops for that year completely. If the officer starts employment again before the twelve month period they pick up their time from the day they left.

Councilman Rosenberger asked about the DROP Program. Manager McElree answered if the officer has ten years of service and separates employment for one year, he would be credited for his ten years and would have to complete an additional fifteen years to qualify for DROP. Manager McElree also added that there is no rank or seniority guarantee. Every three months until the year is up, the resigned officer must make a request in writing to be considered for this policy.

Councilwoman Gaier clarified that the policy is named a Police Leave of Absence Policy, but it is not necessarily a leave of absence in the true sense, as there is no entitlement to come back at any time during that year, it is strictly if the Borough has an opening on the Police Department and Council is interested in an officer to come back.

Motion of Councilman Johnson, seconded by Councilman Propst. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

RESOLVED, That, the following Resolution 47-15, accepting Officer Baccari's request to be eligible for the Police Leave of Absence Policy, be adopted:
