Councilman Johnson advised to amend previously passed Resolution 22-15 for the Upper Bucks Brewfest which will now be held August 29, 2015 instead of August 15, 2015

PLANNING & ZONING COMMITTEE

RESOLVED, That, the following Resolution 56-15, establishing a downtown parking inventory, be adopted:

RESOLUTION 56-15

WHEREAS, the Economic Development Coordinator in planning the revitalization of downtown Quakertown, has recommended Borough Council to consider a parking inventory be completed so as to determine the available parking, as well as, the highest and best parking opportunities throughout the downtown section; and

WHEREAS, the relationship the Borough has established with the Bucks County Planning Commission permits this service without any fees or costs to the Borough.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Council of the Borough of Quakertown wishes to have the Bucks County Planning Commission complete a downtown parking inventory which would provide general recommendations.

President Roberts indicated that Mr. Biddle could speak at this time. Mr. Biddle questioned the cost and scope of the parking inventory. President Roberts answered that there would be no cost to the Borough. Borough Manager stated he would provide Mr. Biddle a copy of the Counties letter to Council providing the scope and rough plan of the boundary study area. Mr. Biddle also mentioned coordinating the new park opening with the ribbon cutting of the

Highland Trail in September or October since the trail is coming through the park.

Motion of Councilwoman Gaier, seconded by Councilman Johnson. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

WHEREAS, an engineering proposal regarding the police department sallyport addition was received from Cowan Associates, Inc. dated February 16, 2015 in the amount of \$33,142.00 which includes design, structural engineering, qualified plans, construction engineering and structural inspections.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That, the Borough Council of Quakertown does hereby accept the proposal from Cowan Associates, Inc. and hereby authorizes the Borough Manager to execute the said proposal on behalf of the Borough of Quakertown.

Motion of Councilman Rosenberger, seconded by Councilman Johnson. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

RESOLVED, That, the following Resolution 59-15, approving plans for the Police Department addition and authorize proceeding with the project, be adopted:

WHEREAS, Cowan Associates, Inc. has prepared elevation and floor plans for the Police Department's addition project; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Manager will keep Council informed of any changes to the plans, as well as, the progress of the project on a regular basis.

NOW,THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That, the Council of the Borough of Quakertown approves Cowan Associates drawings and authorizes the Borough Manager consent to proceed with construction.

Motion of Councilman Rosenberger, seconded by Councilwoman Paulovitz. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

RESOLVED, That, the following Resolution 55-15, authorizing the auction of equipment and vehicles, be adopted:

WHEREAS, the Borough has equipment and vehicles which are readied for disposition; and

WHEREAS, the Pennsylvania Borough Code, Section 1201,2a provides rules to sell property through the bidding or auction process.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the Borough of Quakertown permits the auction of the attached inventory listing police equipment, vehicles and highway equipment through Equipment One which meets all requirements of the Borough Code.

RESOLVED, That, the following Resolution 61-15, advertisement for sewer interceptor project, be adopted:

WHEREAS, the Borough has undertaken a program for the replacement of over four miles of aging, undersized sanitary interceptor sewers; and

WHEREAS, this extensive project is necessary to eliminate public health concerns and to comply with state requirements; and

WHEREAS, the Borough wishes to place a bid advertisement with specifications for the sewer interceptor project.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the Borough of Quakertown authorizes the Borough Manager to proceed with advertising for sealed bids for the sewer interceptor project in accordance to law as provided by the Pennsylvania Borough Code, Section 1402 (a).

Councilman Erwin mentioned that an engineering estimate for the total project is \$6.6 million which will be paid by Bucks County Water & Sewer Authority. Quakertown Borough owns the interceptors and will maintain ownership but Bucks County Water & Sewer Authority is out of capacity causing the need to do the improvements. Quakertown Borough will allow the Authority to discharge into the borough's treatment plant.

Motion of Councilman Erwin, seconded by Councilman Propst. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE

RESOLVED, That, the following Ordinance 1210, prohibiting truck traffic on Tohickon Avenue, be adopted:

Motion of Councilwoman Paulovitz, seconded by Councilwoman to waive the reading of Ordinance 1210. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

ORDINANCE 1210

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF QUAKERTOWN, AMENDING QUAKERTOWN'S CODE OF ORDINANCES BY AMENDING CHAPTER 15, DEALING WITH MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC TO ADD A SECTION OF TOHICKON AVENUE TO THE LIST OF STREETS WHERE TRUCK TRAFFIC IS PROHIBITED

WHEREAS, Quakertown Borough adopted the Borough of Quakertown Code of Ordinances on July 6, 1994; and

WHEREAS, a traffic study prepared by Gilmore & Associates, Inc. recommends that truck traffic be prohibited along a section of Tohickon Avenue; and

WHEREAS, in consideration of said traffic study, and the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Borough of Quakertown and the users of Tohickon Avenue that the Quakertown Code of Ordinances be and is hereby amended as recommended in the Gilmore & Associates, Inc.'s report (See Exhibit A, which is attached hereto, made a part hereof and incorporated herein by reference, and displayed on Exhibit B, which is similarly attached hereto, made a part hereof and incorporated herein by reference).

NOW THEREFORE BE AND IT IS ENACTED AND ORDAINED, the Borough of Quakertown's Code of Ordinances, Chapter 15, Motor Vehicles and Traffic, Part 2, Traffic Regulations is amended as follows by the addition of the following:

At the following locations, truck traffic is limited or prohibited in accordance with traffic signs posted therein.

§214. Tohickon Avenue (S.R. 0212) and Heller Road (T-45):

- 1. Northeast corner, facing south.
 - a. NO TRUCK (R5-2) sign (24" x 24").
 - b. EXCEPT RESIDENTIAL DELIVERIES (R5-2-3) sign (24" x 18").
- 2. Southwest corner, facing west.
 - a. NO TRUCK (R5-2) sign (24" x 24").
 - b. EXCEPT RESIDENTIAL DELIVERIES (R5-2-3) sign (24" x 18").
 - c. NO LEFT TURN (R3-2) sign (24" x 24").
- 3. Northeast corner, facing east.
 - NOT TRUCK (R5-2) sign (24" x 24").
 - b. EXCEPT RESIDENTIAL DELIVERIES (R5-2-3) sign (24" x 18").
 - c. NO RIGHT TURN (R3-1) sign (24" x 24").

Motion of Councilwoman Paulovitz, seconded by Councilwoman Gaier to adopt Ordinance 1210. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

PARKS & RECREATION COMMITTEE

RESOLVED, That, the following Resolution 54-15, setting Bike Night, be adopted:

RESOLUTION 54-15

RESOLVED, That, September 19, 2015 from 2:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., (rain date September 20, 2015 from 12:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.) has been established as "Quakertown Bike Night" for the Borough of Quakertown. This will necessitate the closing of the following streets:

- · Mill Street from Fourth Street to Ninth Street;
- · Fourth Street from Erie Avenue to the New Park Dead End;
- · Including: Quakertown Community Pool parking lot, the skating shelter parking lot, Memorial Park and parking lot.

These roads will be closed two hours prior to the start of Bike Night and also two hours after the end of Bike Night.

Motion of Councilman Propst, seconded by Councilman Johnson. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously carried.

President Roberts indicated that David Lynch could speak at this time. Mr. Lynch introduced a new youth community outreach program in the area which includes high adventure, career workshops and missions including community service. President Roberts asked Mr. Lynch to forward to the Borough Manager the names of the Board of Directors and a list of the involved sponsoring groups.

Manager McElree mentioned that he met with Mr. Lynch and feels it is an exciting program, and is an opportunity that the Youth Aid Panel can engage.

President Roberts indicated that Bill Licopoli could speak at this time. Mr. Licopoli is a resident from Central Bucks and is involved in a youth hockey program. Mr. Licopoli is asking for the possibility of the construction of a hockey court or multi sports rink in Memorial Park for the use of adults and youth. President Roberts suggested Mr. Licopoli meet with the Borough Manager and Councilman Propst to see what the possibilities would be.

Councilman Propst mentioned the Egg Hunt was a huge success with the help of East Swamp Church and support from local businesses.

President Roberts announced that there will be an executive session following this meeting for the matter pertaining to a personnel contract.

President Roberts declared the meeting adjourned at 8:31 p.m.
