

President's Letter

October 1, 2021

As we welcome the autumn season, your Borough team is busy planning the 2022 services, projects and activities that will be undertaken in the new year. The fall is budget season, and again this year everyone in Quakertown Borough is working hard to ensure that the essential services will continue to be delivered with the high quality and professionalism that you have come to expect. Our goal as always is to do this with little or no increases in taxes or utility rates. The budget process will be open to the public during our budget work session (at time of going to press, tentatively scheduled for Thursday, November 4 at 6:00 PM.) and again at the monthly Borough Work Session on Monday, November 22. Adoption of the budget is expected at our December 1 council meeting. Check the Borough website for details.

With the successful bond offering that was undertaken in 2020, which lowered our borrowing costs significantly, and the continued pay down of the debt related to the water project, council is pleased that we can again reduce the residential debt service fee from the previous \$9 to \$6 a month. This reduction will become effective on January 1, 2022.

Work on the swimming pool complex continues, and we anticipate an early summer opening in 2022. It should be an exciting upgrade to the prior pool and again be a popular destination on summer days. You may also have noticed work on QuiNBy's Playground has begun. The new all-inclusive multigenerational playground is estimated to be complete and open to the public this fall.

Last, a sincere thank you to the volunteers and Borough staff that made the Sounds of Summer Concert Series a success, and especially to the concert goers who came out and attended the events. The series culminated with a sold-out concert by the Beach Boys. The Borough Park and Recreation team are busy working on another great line up for 2022.

QUAKERTOWN POLICE **DEPARTMENT HIRES TWO NEW OFFICERS**

On August 2nd, 2021, The Quakertown Borough Police Department proudly welcomed two new police officers, Patrick McTear and Vince Tenaglia. The two officers were sworn in by Magisterial District Judge Lisa Gaier.

Office McTear was born and raised in Southampton, Pennsylvania. From a young age, McTear had a strong desire to serve his community. In 2009, Office McTear began following his desire by becoming a volunteer firefighter followed by becoming an EMT in 2012. After graduating from Penn State University in 2016 with a Bachelor's degree in History, he started his career in Law Enforcement with the North Wildwood Police Department.



After his experience with North Wildwood, he applied to the Philadelphia Police Department and started the academy in December of 2017. After graduating in August 2018, he was assigned to the 12th District where he worked the last out tour of duty. Patrick was also an active member of the Philadelphia Major Incident Response Team (MIRT).

Officer Tenaglia was born and raised in Bristol, Pennsylvania. He attended Bucks County Community College where he received his Associate's degree in Business Administration in 2013. Tenaglia then transferred to Penn State Abington and received his Bachelor of Science degree in Administration of Justice in 2015. While in college, he interned with the United States Postal Inspection Service which exposed him to many facets of law enforcement. This became the driving force to pursue a career in the field.

In 2019, Vince graduated from the Montgomery County Municipal Police academy and received his Act 120 Certification. Vince's law enforcement career began as a patrolman with the Septa Transit Police Department in Philadelphia in October of 2019.






Quakertown Borough Police Department In Partnership with Surrounding Law Enforcement Agencies

With the holiday season rapidly approaching, Quakertown Borough Police Officer Robert Lee and Officers from surrounding Police Departments are preparing for the 11th Annual **SHOP WITH A COP** event on December 9.

SHOP WITH A COP is a national program pairing police officers with children at the elementary school level to afford them a better Christmas. The program allows children to view police officers in a different atmosphere to promote positive relationships. The children are faced with life challenges such as a parent losing a job, homelessness, military deployment, economic shortcomings, and other hardships.

SHOP WITH A COP is funded through the generous donations from our own community, from private sponsors to local businesses. Volunteers from our community help with gift wrapping, hosting, and registration. Each child is allotted a monetary gift card to purchase gifts for themselves and family members, allowing for a more enjoyable holiday. All participating police officers volunteer their own time to support the program.

SHOP WITH A COP started in December 2011 with 14 children and increased to 180 children in 2020, with each child receiving a \$150 Walmart gift card and a school backpack full of essential items.

SHOP WITH A COP was created to help make the holidays brighter for disadvantaged families in the Quakertown School District, and now branched out to our surrounding communities. SNOW REMOVAL

Every person in the Borough that owns or is in charge of any building or parcel in the Borough fronting or abutting on a paved sidewalk in the residential or business district, shall remove and clear away, snow and ice forming a path of at least 24 inches in width. The time limitation shall be 36 hours for the removal of snow, sleet or freezing rain. If there should happen to be a declared state of emergency the time limit shall be 36 hours after the termination of that emergency.

If the snow and ice on a sidewalk becomes so hard that it cannot be removed without the likelihood of damage to the sidewalk, then the person in charge of the removal shall, place sand or other abrasive on the sidewalk to make travel on the sidewalk reasonably safe; and shall then, as soon afterward as weather permits, remove the snow and ice by forming a minimum 24 inch pathway. The snow shall not be removed in such a way that it is deposited on the roadway or vehicular traveled portions of the street.

In the event that the sidewalk does not get cleared, the Borough Manager does have the authority to have those sidewalks cleaned at the expense of the owner or the person in charge at a rate of 10% above the calculated cost of the work.

AUTUMN IS HERE!

THE BOROUGH OF QUAKERTOWN OFFERS AUTUMN SAFETY TIPS FOR THE QUAKERTOWN COMMUNITY

With autumn fast approaching, more and more people in the Quakertown area will be enjoying the change of the leaves and the cooler temperature. Unfortunately, some autumn–related weather activities such as hiking and camping, turning the furnace back on, cleaning the chimney, and trick-or-treating do present their share of hazards. To help ensure everyone in the community enjoys a safe autumn, the Borough of Quakertown offers the following tips and suggests you post them where they are likely to be seen by your family members and co-workers.

CHIMNEY MAINTENANCE IS VITAL TO YOUR FAMILY'S SAFETY.

- Have your chimney inspected and cleaned on a regular basis.
- When possible, burn seasoned woods (dryness of the wood is more important than hard wood versus soft wood).
- Smaller, hotter fires will burn more completely and produce less smoke than larger fires.
- Do not burn cardboard boxes or trash, as they can spark a chimney fire.
- Install stovepipe thermometers, which help monitor flue temperatures where wood stoves are in use, then adjust burning practices as needed.

TRICK-OR-TREAT SAFETY

Don't get caught up in the holiday spirit —make sure your children trick-or-treat safely.

- Rather than buying a mask, use makeup to decorate children. That way, they can see more easily.
- If your kids go trick-or-treating after dusk, make sure they have a flashlight and are wearing retro reflective material. Dress children in warm, light colored clothing so that they may be easily seen when crossing the street.
- Do not purchase Halloween costumes and other items which are not marked "Flameproof" or "Flame-Retardant".
- · Remind children to skip houses that are not well-lit.
- · Check candy before allowing kids to eat it.
- Avoid tricks that could cause bodily injury, destroy property, or cause a fire.

HIKING AND PICNICS/CAMPING

As you take in the fall's beautiful scenery, think ahead, be prepared, and stay safe.

- Check the weather forecast before heading outdoors for a hike. It is not safe to hike when thunderstorms or heavy snowfall is expected.
- · Carry drinking water. Don't drink from streams, springs, or lakes without first properly treating the water.
- Observe wildlife from a safe distance. Don't try and get too close to wild animals.
- Stay on the trail if you leave it, you may get lost.
- To help prevent food poisoning, keep cold foods cold and hot foods hot. Don't store perishable foods in a hot car.
- Clean all surfaces and utensils that come into contact with raw meat or meat juices before re-using them.
- · Wash hands frequently when preparing food, and before serving and eating.
- · Keep kids away from grills and lighter fluid, and keep grills away from anything that can burn them.
- Be aware of tiny deer ticks that carry Lyme disease and know which symptoms to watch out for. When in a potentially infested area, apply insect repellant, wear light-colored, long sleeved-shirts, pants, and socks.
- Do not build a fire near tree trunks, fallen trees, or over hanging branches.
- When extinguishing a campfire, let it die down, then break up the coals or logs, spread the pieces, soak them with water, and then cover the area with dirt or sand.

BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

Parents must do some homework to keep their kids healthy and safe. Don't let safety "fall" by the wayside.

- Walk and ride to school safely. Obey traffic lights and signals, walk only in crosswalks, and listen to the crossing guard.
- · If your kid's bike to school be sure they wear a helmet.
- If possible, always walk your child to the bus stop and pick them up as well.
- Keep backpacks light a child's backpack should only be 5 to 10 percent of his or her body weight, according to the American Chiropractic Association.
- A backpack with wheels is easy to maneuver and reduces back stress. If your child does choose to wear a backpack, utilize both straps. Slinging the backpack over one shoulder may cause spinal curvature.

PET SAFETY

Watch out for family pets as you prepare for the cold, festive days of fall.

- Many brands of antifreeze are highly toxic. Store new and used antifreeze in a sealed container.
- Chocolate is a special treat for nearly all humans during Halloween and Thanksgiving, but it is toxic to dogs, cats, and birds.
- Holiday meals can be hazardous to pets. Chicken and turkey bones can get stuck and pierce the digestive tract. Rich foods can cause pancreatitis or bloating.
- Indoor pets not acclimated to winter temperatures should not be outside in cold weather for long periods. Outdoor pets can withstand fairly cold temperatures, but make sure they have proper shelter from wind and rain, and provide them with good bedding. Frostbite is a winter hazard to pets.

FALL CLEANUP

Yard work does not end simply because summer is over. Here are some safety tips for tackling autumn tasks around your home.

- When lifting heavy bags of mulch, use a wheelbarrow when possible, and remember to lift with your legs, not with your back.
- Be careful when pruning. Pruning from a ladder is especially dangerous.
- To avoid blisters when doing yard work, wear gloves.
- If you are doing a lot of raking, try an ergonomic rake, which can be found at most hardware stores and garden centers

SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING

RECYCLING

On an average week the Borough Sanitation Department collects 10 tons of trash and 3 tons of recycling per day. The Borough currently collects solid waste and recycling from 2848 households in the Borough. The average household in the Borough generates 45.6 pounds of waste per week. The Borough Sanitation Department has made protection of the environment a priority. One of our main goals is to help residents reduce the amount of solid waste that goes to the landfill. The Borough has expanded the Yard Waste Drop-Off program to make it more convenient for residents to dispose of yard waste. The best way residents can do their part, to reducing the amount of solid waste, is to recycle.



There are some easy ways that you can increase the quality of recyclables collected in the Borough.

- Recycled items should be place in the recycling bin loose, not in a trash bag. This allows for the items to be sorted at the recycling facility
- Large items such as milk jugs and 2 liter soda bottles should be flattened
- Cardboard boxes should be broken down. This helps at the recycling facility.
- Do not mix trash with recycling. This causes large amounts of recyclables to be rejected at the sorting facility, which then get disposed of in a landfill.
- Rinse out the recyclables.

WHAT IS COLLECTED TO BE RECYCLED?

Glass: Clear, green, or brown bottles and jars (food and drink only) can be collected. Remove all caps and rings. Please rinse.



Paper: Materials that are collected include newspaper, magazines, advertising inserts, catalogs, junk mail, envelopes, waxed paper, paper bags, phone books, and wrapping paper (remove metallic paper, bows, etc.) Place all paper in heavy brown bag or tie together with twine. Do not use wire or plastic bags.

Cardboard and Corrugated Paper: Cardboard boxes and items such as cereal boxes, tissue boxes, and gift boxes can be collected, as well as milk and juice cartons. Please flatten cardboard.



Cartons: Milk, juice, soup, flavored drinks and aseptic cartons are recycled in some areas. Please check with your municipality. For more information on the recycling of cartons visit www.recyclecartons.com.

High-grade paper: Manila envelopes, file folders, fax and copy paper, and computer print outs are collected for recycling. Please place in paper bags or box (no plastic bags).



Aluminum Cans and Foil: Rinse cans and place in the recycling container. They may be flattened or left intact. Labels do not need to be removed.



Steel & Bi-Metallic Cans: Any food container such as coffee cans or soup cans can be recycled.

SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING

Plastics #1. PET (E): Soft drink bottles, peanut butter jars, and toiletries are collected. Lids and caps should be removed and bottles should be rinsed. 2-liter bottles should be flattened.



Plastics #2. HDPE (clear or colored): Clear plastic items such as milk or juice jugs are collected. Colored plastic bottles include laundry and dish detergents, bleach bottles, and fabric softener bottles.

Plastics #3. PVC: Mineral water bottles, salad and vegetable oil bottles, floor polishes, and mouthwash containers are collected.

Plastics #4 – LDPE (low density polyethylene): Bread bags, food wrapping, and shopping bags are some examples of this type of plastic. LDPE is not often recycled through curbside programs. Plastic shopping bags can be returned to many stores for recycling.

Plastics #5 – PP (polypropylene): This type of plastic is found in yogurt containers, syrup bottles, ketchup bottles, caps, straws, and medicine bottles. Curbside recycling of these materials will vary depending on your area. Please rinse.

Plastics #6 – PS (polystyrene): Disposable plates and cups, meat trays, egg cartons, carry-out containers, aspirin bottles, and compact disc cases may be recycled through curbside recycling depending on your area.

SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING

YARD WASTE DROP OFF

The Borough has expanded our yard waste drop off program for resident. Yard waste is now accepted at the Borough's composting facility Tuesday and Thursday 8am to 3pm. The compost facility is located at the rear entrance of the Borough's Wastewater Treatment Facility, 650 Erie Rd. The compost facility is only available to Borough residents and for yard waste generated in the Borough. Residents may be asked for ID to prove residency. Please follow signs for drop off location. "Yard Waste" is defined as leaves, grass clippings, garden materials, shrub/hedge trimmings, weeds, and brush one inch or less in diameter. The yard waste drop-off and composting are the most environmentally and cost-effective method to collect and dispose of yard waste and leaves. After the material is composted, it is used as a soil enrichment and mulching for Borough use and is offered free to Borough residents.



- Large branch and loose brush drop-off service is only available during regular hours of operation. (8am to 3pm)
- Max size of limbs is six (6) inches in diameter and eight (8) feet in length.
- Loose (untied or un-baled) brush can be dropped off at this site; however, loads must be secured and/or covered while transporting loose materials to the drop-off site.
- NO tree stumps will be accepted.
- Garden waste, shrubbery trimmings, leaves, and grass clippings are accepted.
- No yard waste from commercial sources will be accepted.
- Dumping materials other than yard waste at yard waste locations is strictly forbidden and is considered illegal dumping.
- Only biodegradable paper bags can be left at compost facility. Plastic trash bags are considered illegal dumping.
- No dirt will be accepted.




