President's Letter

October 1, 2022

Autumn brings budget season to the Borough. This is an important time as the administration and council determine and prioritize the projects and public improvements for the subsequent year.

The budget is determined under a 'ground up' basis, where each department carefully assesses what is needed to supply the essential services that the community has come to know and expect. Public safety, utilities and roadways are always of the highest concern and receive the bulk of the budget.

Council and the administration remain committed to providing these necessary and expected functions in a manner that both exceeds your expectations and is effective and cost efficient. We strive to do this without increases in our real estate tax rates or our electric rates. It has been over a decade since our residential electric rates have increased and nearly forty years since our real estate tax millage has changed.

The public is invited to attend our budget work sessions and meetings. A budget work session will be announced for late October or early November. The draft budget is presented and explained at the November 28 work session, and we anticipate voting on the final budget at the December 7 formal meeting.

Enjoy the fall season here in Quakertown. Many events are on tap, including Parks and Recreation Fall Festival, the Lion's Club's Halloween Parade, downtown Christmas Tree Lighting and more. A full calendar can be found on the Borough's website.



New School Bus Safety Program Launched

As our students in our community returned to school this August, Quakertown Borough Police Department is proud to announce the start of a new School Bus Safety Program in partnership with the Quakertown Community School District (QCSD) and in line with PA Motor Vehicle Code § 3345.

As part of the program, all school buses that transport QCSD students will be outfitted with safety technology to make the ride to and from school safer for all. This technology includes stop-arm enforcement cameras designed to detect vehicles that illegally pass stopped school buses while the bus's stop sign arm and red lights are engaged. The police department then reviews the footage to determine whether to issue a violation by mail.

The safety of our children is a top priority. Pennsylvania's Operation Safe Stop reported more than 250 illegal passes in just one school day in 2021, and reports estimate that state school buses are illegally passed 2.18 times per bus per day. QCSD is no exception. Over time, this safety initiative seeks to curb dangerous driving behavior around school buses.

In addition to automated enforcement technology, QCSD buses will be outfitted with other critical safety features, including interior cameras, GPS tracking, and emergency response solutions. All this technology has been provided at zero cost to the school district or taxpayers as the program is 100% violator funded.

Citizens Police Academy

Community oriented policing plays an important and vital role in reducing crime in any community. Therefore the Quakertown Borough Police Department instituted a Citizens Police Academy in 2014 to improve communications and obtain citizen support throughout the borough. The goal of this program is that the graduates will partner with Quakertown Police in identifying problems and solutions to criminal issues that are affecting our community. Graduates can take the knowledge back to their neighborhoods where they can use it to enhance the quality of life.

The Citizens Police Academy is a program designed to provide participants with a working knowledge of the Quakertown Borough Police Department. The program consists of a series of classroom instruction and practical field exercises. There will be a total of eight sessions, held one evening per week for a period of two hours.

The Citizens Police Academy gives an in-depth view into several areas of law enforcement. It is an educational and informative program that allows citizens the opportunity to learn more about the issues that affect law enforcement in Quakertown Borough.

Individuals who apply for the Citizens Police Academy must be 18 years of age. The academy is open to anyone, but priority will be given to those who live or work in Quakertown Borough. The academy is offered at no cost. A valid driver's license is required and applicants may be subject to a background check. The academy will begin on Tuesday, March 7th, 2023 at 6:30pm. Project Lifesaver

The Quakertown Borough Police Department is proud to offer the Project Lifesaver program! Project Lifesaver is the premier search and rescue program operated internationally by public safety agencies and is strategically designed for "at risk" individuals who are prone to the life threatening behavior of wandering. The primary mission of Project Lifesaver is to provide timely response to save lives and reduce potential injury for adults and children with the propensity to wander due to a cognitive condition. Project Lifesaver is a community based, public safety, non-profit organization that provides law enforcement, and caregivers with a program designed to protect, and when necessary, quickly locate individuals with cognitive disorders who are prone to wandering. The necessity of this program was determined through the correlation between cognitive conditions and the act of wandering. With the dramatic increase of cognitive conditions since the inception of the organization, the program has grown from a localized program to a program recognized internationally as a proven and effective method of "bringing loved one's home."

Project Lifesaver was the first to apply such locating techniques to aid in the search and rescue of individuals and is the most widely used and proven most effective program in the nation that is specifically designed to protect the "at risk" populations in our communities. The program was structured in a way that strategically combined state of the art locating technologies, innovative search and rescue methods, and community policing courses that educated first responders about cognitive conditions. The search times for certified Project Lifesaver agencies have been reduced from hours, potentially days, down to minutes. Recovery times for Project Lifesaver agencies average 30 minutes, which is 95% less time than standard operations without Project Lifesaver. The method relies on proven radio technology and specially trained search and rescue teams. Citizens enrolled in Project Lifesaver wear a small transmitter on the wrist or ankle that emits an individualized frequency signal. If an enrolled client goes missing, the caregiver notifies their local Project Lifesaver agency, and a trained emergency team responds to the wanderer's area. The first responders will then use the client's individualized frequency to locate the position of the individual. The knowledge given from the community policing courses is best applied in this situation because the first responders will know how to best approach the client once found, and allow them to be brought back to safety.

SHOP WITH A COP is a national program pairing police officers with children at the elementary school level to afford them a better Christmas. The program allows children to view police officers in a different atmosphere to promote positive relationships. The children are faced with life challenges such as a parent losing a job, homelessness, military deployment, economic shortcomings, and other hardships.

SHOP WITH A COP is funded through the generous donations from our own community, from private sponsors to local businesses. Volunteers from our community help with gift wrapping, hosting, and registration. Each child is allotted a monetary gift card to purchase gifts for themselves and family members, allowing for a more enjoyable holiday. All participating police officers volunteer their own time to support the program.

SHOP WITH A COP started in December 2011 with 14 children and increased to over 230 children in 2021, with each child receiving a \$150 Walmart gift card and a school backpack full of essential items.

SHOP WITH A COP was created to help make the holidays brighter for disadvantaged families in the Quakertown School District, and now branched out to our surrounding communities. Electronic Bill Payment: The Borough of Quakertown offers electronic bill payment at invoicecloud.com/quakertownpa. If the bill payment is made through an automatic charge to your credit card or an automatic withdrawal from your bank account, you have the right to know when the automatic payment will be made – either the number of days after the bill is issued or the actual date. You are not required to enroll in an electronic payment program even if you choose to receive your bill electronically. An online banking fee in the amount of \$3.50 is charged for each credit card transaction.

What Is LIHEAP?

LIHEAP is a Federally-funded program that helps low-income households with their home energy bills. LIHEAP can help you stay warm in the winter and cool in the summer. By doing so, you can reduce the risk of health and safety problems (such as illness, fire, or eviction).

The federal government does not provide energy assistance directly to the public. Instead, LIHEAP operates in the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Indian tribes or tribal organizations, and the U.S. territories.

Who Is Eligible To Receive LIHEAP Assistance?

The LIHEAP program in your community determines if your household's income qualifies for the program. The LIHEAP program may also require households to meet additional eligibility criteria to receive LIHEAP assistance.*

*NOTE: The availability of LIHEAP assistance is not guaranteed. Often most of the Federal LIHEAP funds are spent during the winter.

How Do I Apply?

DHS will be accepting LIHEAP applications through the COMPASS website or by paper application. You may call **1-877-395-8930** to request a paper application be mailed to you. Paper applications can be mailed to the County Assistance Office (CAO) in your county.

What is LIHWAP?

The Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is a temporary emergency program to help low-income families pay overdue water bills. LIHWAP is a grant. You do not have to repay it.

How does LIHWAP work?

LIHWAP Crisis grant may be available if you have an emergency and are in jeopardy of losing your water service. You can receive one Crisis grant for your drinking water service and one Crisis grant for your wastewater service, up to \$2,500 each.

AUTUMN SAFETY TIPS



Autumn is Here!

The Borough of Quakertown Offers
Autumn Safety Tips
for the Quakertown Community



With autumn fast approaching, more and more people in the Quakertown area will be enjoying the change of the leaves and the cooler temperature. Unfortunately, some autumn-related weather activities such as hiking and camping, turning the furnace back on, cleaning the chimney, and trick-or-treating do present their share of hazards. To help ensure everyone in the community enjoys a safe autumn, the Borough of Quakertown offers the following tips and suggests you post them where they are likely to be seen by your family members and co-workers.

Chimney maintenance is vital to your family's safety.

- · Have your chimney inspected and cleaned on a regular basis.
- · When possible, burn seasoned woods (dryness of the wood is more important than hard wood versus soft wood).
- Smaller, hotter fires will burn more completely and produce less smoke than larger fires.
- · Do not burn cardboard boxes or trash, as they can spark a chimney fire.
- Install stovepipe thermometers, which help monitor flue temperatures where wood stoves are in use, then adjust burning practices as needed.

TRICK-OR-TREAT SAFETY

Don't get caught up in the holiday spirit —make sure your children trick-or-treat safely.

- Rather than buying a mask, use makeup to decorate children. That way, they can see more easily.
- If your kids go trick-or-treating after dusk, make sure they have a flashlight and are wearing retro reflective material. Dress children in warm, light colored clothing so that they may be easily seen when crossing the street.
- Do not purchase Halloween costumes and other items which are not marked "Flameproof" or "Flame-Retardant".
- · Remind children to skip houses that are not well-lit.
- · Check candy before allowing kids to eat it.
- Avoid tricks that could cause bodily injury, destroy property, or cause a fire.

HIKING AND PICNICS/CAMPING



As you take in the fall's beautiful scenery, think ahead, be prepared, and stay safe.

- Check the weather forecast before heading outdoors for a hike. It is not safe to hike when thunderstorms or heavy snowfall is expected.
- Carry drinking water. Don't drink from streams, springs, or lakes without first properly treating the water.
- · Observe wildlife from a safe distance. Don't try and get too close to wild animals.
- Stay on the trail if you leave it, you may get lost.
- To help prevent food poisoning, keep cold foods cold and hot foods hot. Don't store perishable foods in a hot car.
- Clean all surfaces and utensils that come into contact with raw meat or meat juices before re-using them.
- · Wash hands frequently when preparing food, and before serving and eating.
- Keep kids away from grills and lighter fluid, and keep grills away from anything that can burn them.
- Be aware of tiny deer ticks that carry Lyme disease and know which symptoms to watch out for. When in a potentially infested area, apply insect repellant, wear light-colored, long sleeved-shirts, pants, and socks.
- · Do not build a fire near tree trunks, fallen trees, or over hanging branches.
- When extinguishing a campfire, let it die down, then break up the coals or logs, spread the pieces, soak them with water, and then cover the area with dirt or sand.

BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

Parents must do some homework to keep their kids healthy and safe. Don't let safety "fall" by the wayside.

- · Walk and ride to school safely. Obey traffic lights and signals, walk only in crosswalks, and listen to the crossing guard.
- If your kid's bike to school be sure they wear a helmet.
- If possible, always walk your child to the bus stop and pick them up as well.
- Keep backpacks light a child's backpack should only be 5 to 10 percent of his or her body weight, according to the American Chiropractic Association.
- A backpack with wheels is easy to maneuver and reduces back stress. If your child does choose to wear a backpack, utilize both straps. Slinging the backpack over one shoulder may cause spinal curvature.

PET SAFETY

Watch out for family pets as you prepare for the cold, festive days of fall.

- Many brands of antifreeze are highly toxic. Store new and used antifreeze in a sealed container.
- Chocolate is a special treat for nearly all humans during Halloween and Thanksgiving, but it is toxic to dogs, cats, and birds.
- Holiday meals can be hazardous to pets. Chicken and turkey bones can get stuck and pierce the digestive tract. Rich foods can cause pancreatitis or bloating.
- Indoor pets not acclimated to winter temperatures should not be outside in cold weather
 for long periods. Outdoor pets can withstand fairly cold temperatures, but make sure they have proper shelter from
 wind and rain, and provide them with good bedding. Frostbite is a winter hazard to pets.

FALL CLEANUP

Yard work does not end simply because summer is over. Here are some safety tips for tackling autumn tasks around your home.

- When lifting heavy bags of mulch, use a wheelbarrow when possible, and remember to lift with your legs, not with your back.
- Be careful when pruning. Pruning from a ladder is especially dangerous.

view the following reminders:

- To avoid blisters when doing yard work, wear gloves.
- If you are doing a lot of raking, try an ergonomic rake, which can be found at most hardware stores and garden centers

Most important of all, remember to call 911 in the event of an emergency.

PUBLIC WORKS CURBSIDE LEAF COLLECTION

The Public Works Department will begin their **Fall Curbside Leaf Collection on Monday, October 3rd**. Leaves will be collected every Monday throughout the month of October. To ensure a successful curbside leaf collection at your residence, please

- Leaves should be raked to the curb by 7:00am Monday morning
- · Leaves should be no more than 5 feet from the curb line
- Piles of leaves should not be places within 10 feet of any catch basin or within 20 feet of any intersection
- Sticks, stones, cans, or other hard materials should not be place in your pile. These items damage our leaf vacuum If these items are mixed in your leaf piles, it will result in a non-pickup.



As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly.



PICKING THE TREE

 Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.



PLACING THE TREE

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.



LIGHTING THE TREE

- Use lights that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

After Christmas

Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home.

Check with your local community to find a recycling program.

Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

FACTS

- ! Almost one third of home Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems.
- Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious.
- (!) A heat source too close to the tree causes more than one in every five of the fires.
